Fun Facts About Pollinators

- ❖ The Forgotten Pollinators Campaign estimates
 - One in every three bites of food is made possible by a pollinator.
 - 2/3 of the crops grown around the world depend on animal pollinators.
- ❖ Pollinators depend on native plants & habitats to live & feed.
 - Only with these natural supports can they tend to our crops on which we depend.

California Monarch Butterfly (*Danaus plexippus*)

- ❖ Makes an annual round trip migration from Canada to US to Mexico & back.
 - They over-winter along the coast of California
- ❖ Monarchs need food & resting places during their 2,800 mile long journey.
 - Nectar bearing plants along the migratory corridors help to feed the adults:
 - Rabbitbrush (*Ericameria nauseosa*)
 - Desert Broom (*Baccharis* spp.)
 - Aster
 - Helianthus
 - Solidago
 - Verbena
 - Trifolium
 - Asclepias

What can we do to help?

- ❖ **Explore Butterfly Gardening**
 - Plant milkweed everywhere to feed their caterpillars (It's the only food they eat!).
 - Promote nectar rich roadsides/neighborhoods/parks/gardens/schoolyards to feed adults.
 - Your local native plant society can provide information where to get the plants or seeds.
- ❖ **Become a Certified Monarch Waystation**
 - Register your garden & assist in the conservation of the monarch butterfly in N. America.
- ❖ **Be an Advocate**
 - Speak up for the conservation of butterflies.
- ❖ **Become a Citizen Scientist**
 - Public land management agencies can train people to conduct monarch monitoring & other activities.
- ❖ **Donate**
 - Your time, talents, books & knowledge.
