



### LACCD – BY THE NUMBERS

- Nine Colleges
- LACCD serves over 230,000 students
- Completions
  - 48 BA Degrees
  - 15,354 Degrees
  - 10,352 Certificates
  - I,647 Noncredit Certificates
  - 1,313 Private and out-of-state transfers
  - 5,328 CSU Transfers
  - 1,183 UC transfers



### DUAL ENROLLMENT

- Offering credit courses to high school students during the school day
  - Credit for college and high school
  - Exclusive to high school students
- CCAP focuses on expanding offerings to students who may not have already been college bound.
- Has a programmatic focus developed between the college and high school with a student goal in mind
  - "College Pathway" aligned with the General Education requirements for an AA degree, or within the IGETC or CSU Breadth requirements for transfer.
  - "CTE Pathway," aligned with a specific career track



### DUAL ENROLLMENT OUTCOMES



- CCRC evaluated eight dual enrollment programs involving 10 colleges and 21 high schools
  - More likely to graduate from high school
  - More likely to transition to a four-year college rather than a two-year college
  - Less likely to take basic skills courses in college
  - More likely to persist in postsecondary education
  - Accumulating more college credits

### RE-ENVISIONING REMEDIATION

- High school performance data (GPA, coursework, course grades) now used for placement
- Placement must provide the student with the greatest opportunity/likelihood of succeeding in the transfer-level course
- Most students placed at transfer-level
  - All students have the right to transfer-level
- No courses more than one level below transfer will be offered at LACCD
- Students passing Intermediate Algebra in High School do not need to take math for local AA degrees

- Free Chromebook


#### Students MUST:

- Apply for Financial Aid (FAFSA/Dream/BOG)
- Enroll full-time
- Participate in Summer transition
- Enroll in required English/Math (per educational plan)
- Participate in Success Activities including major/career exploration (as prescribed by college)




### **ADDITION SUPPORT**

### Los Angeles College Promise Outcomes

- The LACP has achieved significant program outcomes:
  - Increased Access: Overall enrollment for recent graduates increased by 24% since Fall 2016
  - Increased Full-Time Enrollment: Full-time enrollments of first-time college students increased by 56% district-wide from Fall 2016 to Fall 2018
  - Students report LACP influencing decision to attend college, to attend an LACCD college, and to attend fulltime
