Using the vocabulary and structures learned, students will be able to <i>perform</i> beginning elementary everyday communicative functions in French orally and in writing.	Evidence of attainment of the SLO may include (but is not limited to) the written <i>preparation</i> and oral <i>performance</i> of role plays, sketches, audio/video portfolios, presentations, etc., in the target language. These may be <i>presented</i> as a live <i>sketch</i> or <i>dramatized</i> in audio/video format and will include provisions for <i>self-assessment</i> and <i>revisions</i> . A linguistic rubric will be used to <i>assess</i> the students' output (see attached).
Students will be able to recognize the relationship between culture and language use, identify common traits of Spanish and Spanish-speaking cultures, and examine the similarities and differences of these common traits with their own culture.	Evidence of mastery of this SLO may include (but is not limited to) exams and/or the design of cultural projects, reports, or presentations in print and/or electronically (PowerPoint or websites). A cultural rubric will be used to <i>assess</i> the students' output (see attached).
