# The Concurrent Enrollment Nursing Cohort Program

## How It Works

- **A cohort of 15-25 associate (RN) nursing students at a community college are enrolled together (at a discounted tuition rate) in the University of Phoenix® bachelor's (BSN) nursing program.**
- **They begin taking their bachelor's coursework while they are still earning their associate degree.**
- **After completing their associate degree, they are able to complete their bachelor's in as little as six months.**

## The Benefits

### Saves students time, without overloading their schedules.

- Students are able to earn their associate and bachelor's degrees in less than three years total. Yet, because they typically take their bachelor's classes on term breaks, their course loads always remain within a manageable full-time range.

### Saves students money.

- Concurrent Enrollment students receive 20% off University of Phoenix tuition, and their tuition rate is frozen.
- In addition, the majority of participants' University of Phoenix student fees are waived.\*

### Provides a powerful support system for success.

- Because cohort students proceed through their bachelor's coursework as one group, they often develop close personal bonds, motivating and supporting one another toward successfully completing their degrees—and even beyond graduation as they build their careers.
