



#### Avantika Bawa Parallel Faults March 2017

In Parallel Faults large painterly gestures sweep across the gallery. Topographical maps of the surrounding San Fernando Valley and San Gabriel Fault line inform the scale, colors and patterns of the swaths. Stretches of silence are interrupted with multi-channel field recordings of tremors and earthquake sounds procured from geophysicists. The diagonal thrust of the visuals and the spatial distribution of sound synthesize to create a feeling of movement, raw power, and unease.










#### LAUNCH Annual Student Art Exhibition May 2017




#### rough patches and glitter Jeffry Mitchell + Garry Noland September 2017

#### MAKE/WORK


Using the wall drawings of Sol LeWitt as a launching off point, MAKE/WORK questions the role of artist and laborer and establishes a scenario where language and interpretation challenge ideas and execution. Five artists have been invited to submit work in the form of directions. Over the course of the exhibition run LAVC students and faculty will produce their works according to the guidelines provided. Ranging from the most highly detailed to the very wide open, the artists' instructions utilize specific standard measurements, custom stencils, the sun as a mapping device, and the body as ruler.

MAKE/WORK is an exhibition produced in collaboration with the Los Angeles Valley College student body and five nationally recognized artists. Contributors to this project include Roy Dowell, Dahlia Elsayed, Adam D. Miller, Renee Petropoulos, and Robert Yoder.


