Too often, students feel apolitical, I want to change that by creating a system that keeps students informed and involved.

Beyond just informing students, I will actively advocate for student rights at the state and district level to ensure that LAVC students have strong representation. College policies, state funding, and legislative decisions influence our everyday lives, and we need someone who will fight to protect student interests. As a Ukrainian student, I deeply understand the value of having a voice in decision-making, and I want to make sure that LAVC students are not left out of important conversations. I plan to work with student advocacy groups, college officials, and organizations that represent student interests to ensure that LAVC is well represented when it comes to decisions about funding, education policy, and student rights.
